A Practical Guide to Dewey Decimal Classification

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What is Library Classification?



The process of fitting a resource into a **pre-determined hierarchy of concepts** and then **assigning notation** that represents the resource's topic.

The notation is typically numeric (numbers) or alphanumeric (numberletter) and it:

- 1) Brings together (collocates) works on the same topic
- 2) Provides a physical or virtual address for a resource

What is Library Classification?



The most popular library classification systems in the United States are:

- Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC) contains only numbers in class number (940.52) and is used primarily by school and public libraries
- 2) Library of Congress Classification (LCC) contains numbers <u>and</u> letters in class number (D811.5) and is used primarily by academic libraries

Call Numbers

 It is not uncommon for libraries use their own call numbers without class numbers, which is fine, but can result in many books having the same call number.

 In larger collections it is important to create unique call numbers, if possible.



Melvil Dewey



Lived 1851-1931 – as a student assistant at Amherst College in Amherst, Mass. (early 1870s), Dewey set out to create a system where each library item could have a permanent "address" that could be used at any library...the **"relative location system"**

Dewey Decimal Classification

•Most widely used library classification scheme in the world. Regularly revised.

•Currently owned by OCLC, but development and maintenance of DDC occurs within the DDC editorial office at the Library of Congress (where it has resided since 1923).

- •Unabridged edition = 23rd edition
- •Abridged edition = 15th edition

•Also in web form = WebDewey (contains both abridged & unabridged editions)

About the Introduction

- 1.1 This Introduction explains the basic principles and structure of the Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC) system.
- 1.2 The Introduction is intended to be used in conjunction with the Glossary and the Manual. The Glossary defines terms used in the Introduction and elsewhere in the Classification. The Manual offers advice on classifying in difficult areas and explains how to choose between related numbers.

Classification: What It Is and What It Does

- 2.1 *Classification* provides a system for organizing knowledge. Classification may be used to organize knowledge represented in any form, e.g., books, documents, electronic resources.
- 2.2 *Notation* is the system of symbols used to represent the classes in a classification system. In the Dewey Decimal Classification, the notation is expressed in Arabic numerals. The notation gives both the unique meaning of the class and its relation to other classes. The notation provides a universal language to identify the class and related classes, regardless of the fact that different words or languages may be used to describe the class.

History, Current Use, and Development of the Dewey Decimal Classification

3.1 The Dewey Decimal Classification—conceived by Melvil Dewey in 1873 and first published in 1876—is a general knowledge organization tool that is continuously revised to keep pace with knowledge. The system is further extended through number building, interoperable translations, association with categorized content, and mappings to other subject schemes.

Portrait of an editor: Constantin Mazney

I have been researching previous editors of the DDC for a project you may hear more of later this year. As you can imagine, much has been written about some of these men and women; several have their own Wikipedia articles. But details on a few of them were scarce, even in John Comaromi's excellent Eighteen editions of the Dewey Decimal Classification, published in the DDC's centennial year of 1976. One of those was Constantin J. Mazney. We knew Mazney was editor-in-chief for Edition 14, published in 1942, but not much more. In this post, I'll share more details I found, along with the work of a few people I thank at the end.

Constantin John Mazney was born May 17, 1889, in Odessa, now in Ukraine, then a part of the Russian Empire. He had a musical background, first earning a music degree from Moscow Imperial Conservatory (now Moscow State Tchaikovsky Conservatory) before immigrating to the United States in 1923. He listed his occupation as choirmaster in 1929 when applying for naturalization. We also know he worked as a schoolteacher in Detroit during this period.

In the US, Mazney studied at the University of Michigan. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees in library science there, and worked in the university library from 1935 to 1938 before moving to the Library of Congress. At Michigan, Mazney studied under Margaret Mann, who recommended him for the DDC editorship after the death of Dorcas Fellows. According to Comaromi, it was largely in deference to Mann that Mazney was chosen as editor-in-chief.

Mazney oversaw the production of Edition 14, but it was unfortunately not a smooth process, exceeding its budget and missing deadlines. I can only speculate as to whether World War II exacerbated this—maybe I'm projecting current-day "supply chain issues" onto the past! Shortly after its publication, Mazney was relieved of his position by the Decimal Classification Committee.

Whether or not World War II more directly affected the production of Edition 14, public records from around that time show Mazney registered for the military draft, though he would have been in his 50s at this point. Records from the University of Michigan have him at the "Research Library" in Upton, NY in 1949, perhaps at the Brookhaven National Laboratory. (Incidentally, one of the operators of Brookhaven today is Battelle, a research organization OCLC has collaborated with most recently for the <u>REALM Project</u>.)

At any rate, Mazney seems to have returned to Washington, DC at some point, and died here in December 1951. He never married. He willed about \$5500, around \$50,000 today, to help fund a University of Michigan student award in Mann's honor, which is still in place today (and not to be confused with ALA's Margaret Mann Citation).

I enjoyed learning more about this man who had my job (more or less) 80 years ago, and hope you found this an interesting read too. If you have any corrections or additions, I'm happy to hear them. For people of Mazney's time, we only have literal paper trails, and can only piece together the whole story from sometimes ephemeral documents. I hope future biographers will have an easier time of it. I ditched Facebook over 10 years ago, but my LinkedIn is reasonably up to date.

My thanks to MP Satija and Allie Alvis for research assistance, and to Jacob Nugent at the University of Michigan's Bentley Historical Library for the same, plus the image. The timing of this post is coincidental, and has been in the works 15 for several weeks.

DDC Hierarchical Structure

10 main <u>classes</u> (e.g., 600 - Technology)

Each class has 10 <u>divisions</u> - represented by second digit of the notation (e.g., 610 – Medicine & Health)

Each division has 10 <u>sections</u> – represented by the third digit of the notation (e.g., 616 – Diseases)

After each section, you can create more specific notation after a decimal point if you need to incorporate specific aspects of the subject (e.g., 616.3 – Diseases of the digestive system)

Important Note: Dewey class numbers will always be at least 3 digits long. If longer, a decimal point must be placed between the third and fourth digits.

DDC Notation "Expressiveness"

- DDC is very "expressive"
- Expressiveness of any notation refers to the extent that <u>the system of symbols</u> expresses the relationships found among the category statements.
- "In other words, the number of characters in the classmark for a subject corresponds directly to the position of the subject in the hierarchy." (Broughton, 2015)

The full meaning of a DDC number depends on its position in the hierarchy to which it belongs (i.e., the context).

DDC Number Building

- We can build class numbers that include attributes such as the format of the resource (e.g., dictionary, periodical), time period (e.g., 20th century, 1950s), and geographic location (e.g., United States, Pacific Ocean).
- With the addition of table notations (which are not required, by the way), as well as other notation that can be added through other types of number building, DDC numbers can get pretty lengthy.

DDC Advantages



- DDC was the first classification scheme to use the concept of relative location to organize materials on the shelf
- The pure notation (i.e., all Arabic numbers) is recognized internationally
- The hierarchical notation expresses the relationship between and among class numbers
- The decimal system enables infinite expansion and subdivision

DDC Disadvantages



- Its Anglo-American bias is evident in its emphasis on American, English, and European language, literature, and history in the 400s (Language), 800s (Literature), and 900s (History), and Protestantism/Christianity in the 200s (Religion)
- Some related disciplines are separated: e.g., 400 and 800; 300 (Social Science) and 900
- Some subjects are not comfortably placed (e.g., Computer science in 000; Psychology as part of Philosophy in 100)

DDC Disadvantages



- In the 800s, literary works by the same author are scattered according to form (e.g., Shakespeare's poems (821) are separated from his plays (822))
- Decimal numbering limits its capacity for accommodating subjects on the same level because there can only be 9 divisions
- Different rates of growth of some disciplines have resulted in an uneven structure (e.g., 300 (Social science) and 600 (Technology) are particularly overcrowded)

DDC Disadvantages



- Specificity results in long numbers, which can be awkward for shelving and on spine labels
- Altering numbers because of a new edition creates practical problems in libraries (e.g., the need for reclassification, relabeling, and reshelving – this is why Dewey insisted, as much as possible, on the "integrity of numbers")

- There are often references to the Manual within the schedules and tables so that the classifier knows to go there for further information about a specific number, range of numbers, or choice among numbers

Use <u>391</u> for clothing customs, such as what was worn, what is now fashionable, national costumes, e.g., Edwardian fashion 391.0094109041, Lithuanian national costumes 391.0094793. Use <u>646.3</u> for home economics aspects of clothing, such as how to dress on a limited budget, select the best quality clothing, dress correctly for the business world. Use <u>746.92</u> for artistic aspects of clothing, such as clothing considered as a product of the textile arts, fashion design. If in doubt, prefer in the following order: <u>391, 746.92, 646.3</u> .

Number Building in DDC

 In order to get greater specificity in Dewey, you often have to "build" Dewey numbers.

- There are different ways to build:
 - Through tables and instructions within Dewey
 - Through the separate Tables 1-6

DDC Tables

•The notation from the Tables is <u>never</u> used alone, but attached to class numbers from the Schedules as instructed for greater specificity - table notation <u>not required</u>

•Table notation will always begin with a long hyphen:

- --81 (Brazil)
- --0905 (21st century)
- --0727 (Statistical methods)

- Otherwise, DDC encourages assigning individual biographies the class number associated with the subject's "most noted contribution," then adding –092 from Table 1.
